WE GET KNOCKED DOWN, BUT WE GET UP

It will not surprise you that I was my parents' favourite child and still remain so... Being the oldest of 5, Mum and Dad should not have had a favourite, but it was so obvious. Never in trouble, always on time, never arguing with my siblings, you get the picture, right?

My middle brother, let's just call him, "evil Andrew", was a problem. Sure, hardworking, smart, good at absolutely everything, but he had a dark side. Messing up family photos with stupid faces, blowing out his younger brother's birthday candles before the end of the song, just a nightmare. Honestly, too hard to handle. Amazingly, it was, but the phrase "new normal" summed it up. Cash had disappeared, for many, offices had as well, thousands had moved to the country, Uni students were nowhere to be seen. Cashed up and free, people spent up on "going out", not certain that it was legal, but keen to give it a go.

After we settled, the one thing that first bought joy was a thing called "re-acquaintance". Initially, with family members estranged by LD6, then close friends and finally our broader community.

"Have you had Covid?" and "are you vaccinated?" were the new "conversation starters". Depending on your point of view, they could start anything from a laugh with the likeminded to an all-in brawl on the steps of Parliament. As time wore on, that too settled down.

In the case of the Camberwell Hockey Club, our members knew we were still there because our wonderful Communications group told us we were. They never stopped the presses ("presses", for those who have forgotten, were machines that printed actual newspapers on paper, which were then delivered to your house... yeah, I know, hilarious!)

Meanwhile back at CHC, summer hockey was tentively planned and optimism grew. Sadly, we had just lost Steve Laussen from the junior committee and while the Women's, Men's and Masters sections got up and running a new group needed to be found for the Junior program.

In what can be defined as a "typical Camberwell moment" a new committee started to take shape, guided by the old guard, Jane Oldham. Enter Sarah Church, Mel Norquay, Bronwen Kohne, Hamish Ridland (and the Hin2H support We get knocked down, but we get up again... Continued...



team), Lena Perriman, Scott Cashmere and the incredible Nathan Copey. This group summed up the tasks, tapped people on the shoulder and had Hin2H, indoor and preparations for the approaching winter 2022 season emerged. Help came from all quarters, too many to list as the Junior Program had new life and delivered 15 teams for round one and 50+ Hin2H players. We found a new junior chair, Marcus Edwards, and the puzzle was complete.

juniors turned up to get expert coaching from our Premier League elite. Four great sessions and a welcome preseason back at the club.

Victorian sporting participation was suffering as clubs across all sports and age groups suffered large declines. Surveys released suggested that declines in some sports were up to 40% and higher in juniors. This threatened many clubs and Camberwell was not immune. We had 45 teams in the first half of 2021 before LD6 shut us down and 41 teams in 2022. Numbers stabilised after a slow start. In the case of the CHC women, they added a team to buck the trend.

Over the summer, two wonderful upgrades were installed; a new playing surface, fully funded by the great financial management of boards past and a new scoreboard, also fully funded by club donors and the Community Bank - Canterbury, who we welcomed as a new club sponsor. These two projects keep Camberwell at the leading edge of facilities and providing the best we can to our players and supporters. For those who follow the pitch upgrades closely, minor repairs were done to the underlay, which remained in excellent condition and set for another 7 odd years of heavy traffic.

Momentum into the season was exciting to watch and a great night presenting our 40FORTY Premier League uniforms to our top men's and women's teams before round one and the stage was set.

We had to wait until round 3 for our first home MPL and WPL games and the club gathered enmass on a beautiful autumn day. The Life Members and Sponsors luncheon on that day with the opening of the scoreboard were highlights along with top grade hockey returning to Matlock after 10 months. As the season evolved, the women's section was looking very good in all grades and our men's very solid too.

Eventually, as the home and away season reached the end, we had 20 teams in finals, 11 made it to grand finals and 6 teams won flags. The last two grand final games of the season at Parkville, 17 September, was a classic Camberwell Club supporter day. Initially, victory to the MPLR with a 2-1 comeback after the previous 31 straight wins in 2021 and 2022. The MPL with an emphatic 4-1 powerful display taking the flag. Tremendous celebrations and support from the Tangerine army topped off a great year.

Off field, the volunteer army was mobilised early February. There are nearly 200 jobs done at the club by those who freely give their time and skill. The list is huge and the tasks many and in September we celebrated their contribution with a night at the club. Thank you to all who gave their best to the task they had.

Special mentions can never cover all, but the Comms group, Mental Health First Aid, Trivia night and the newly formed Junior committees need to be mentioned.

The remarkable assistance that comes from Sponsors also needs to be called out. The long-term commitment of Platinum Shirt Sponsor Will Unkles of 40FORTY, Platinum Luke & Sam Temby Echo Cartons, Andrew Henderson CANDOR Group, Scoreboard Sponsor Community Bank- Canterbury Branch, Equipment sponsor Just Hockey and the wonderful list of Summer Masters teams sponsors. The assistance provides opportunities for facility upgrades and off field activities to create a great club.

Lastly, to the Board of our club, I give my profound thanks. Pip Mann, Stuart Will, Sara Conyers, Mary Phillips, Suz Cannell, Nick Ryan and the indefatigable John Unkles for their effort, time, council and vigilance in setting the direction for our club. Additionally, I thank Steve Prior, who is stepping down after a total of nine years on the board representing the Juniors and then Men's sections along with his special project work. Steve's contribution has been significant and he has indicated a desire to stay close to those projects he gets the most enjoyment from.

This year we re-emerged from the gloom and we continued on relentlessly toward our goal as a club for all ages, genders and abilities both on and off the field.

ROY CAREY

Our New Life Member Roy Carey has been involved with the club for over 30 years and served as President for 4 years from 1997-2000.

As President, Roy continued building the relationship with the council forged by earlier boards and those since, to gain ongoing support, more on field time, better facilities and fending off "non believing" neighbours determined to bring us down. This work laid the foundations for the outstanding relationship with the council we have today and the culture built on respecting our neighbours.

Roy was known for his closeness to the players as a mentor building a team culture, self-belief, mental focus and a sense of responsibility as elite players at the club. He was regarded as the players president having a major focus on club success on field and player development.

Off the field, Roy bought generational change to the structure and accountability of the board. Appointing people on merit, professional qualifications and accountability for portfolios. The structures you see today that we accept as a professional approach were forged during this time.

Roy also took the club to a new level with medical care for players. As a surgeon, Roy understood the value of pregame, during and post-game treatment of players. He developed relationships with local physiotherapists and set the standards envied by other clubs. A standard we rely on today. The introduction of afternoon teas for our top teams after Matlock games was also introduced during this time for foster a culture of respect and friendship between competing teams.

Roy has remained a volunteer medical officer available to all players throughout the decades of membership. Roy arranged the equipping our medical/physiotherapy room(s) (past & present) with electric tables for medical treatment of players including physiotherapy treatment. He further arranged for medical supplies to be donated to the club thus saving financial resources for a considerable number of years. The Roy Carey Medical Room is testament to this enormous and sustained body of work.

Roy was heavily involved in our Junior section from his earliest days. A volunteer parent, a superb organiser, an enthusiastic and effective committee member, dispenser of medical advice, band aids, bandages and arranger of instant hospital treatment if that was required.

Roy saw the need to have our club as a 'whole' club and for the then separate Camberwell Women's Club to be fully within the structure. He had many discussions with Terry Ryan, who succeeded him as President and could be rightly said to have helped lay the foundations for subsequent negotiations and discussions which led CHC to be a 'whole' club in 2004. This should not be forgotten. As a club, we have grown and developed amazingly since this time. We are better for the diversity, the cooperation and coordination of the sections, the social cohesion, the pathways for developing juniors, coaches and umpires and of course lots more teams to support. We would not be in the position we are today without Roy's foresight.

Roy has contributed enormously to the

development and wellbeing of our Club. He is widely known as a CHC member, and is an immensely valued medical adviser not only to the Club but also to HV and HA thus promoting our culture and our values by placing this club squarely in the public consciousness. His public persona enhances the reputation and lustre of CHC, placing it at the forefront of a knowledgeable Australia wide hockey community.

Sport is Life... Steve loved sport and saw the value of the lessons we learn, the friendships

we make, the thrill of victory and the despair of defeat. Steve immersed himself in a number of sports and sporting clubs. We at Camberwell were blessed to be one of those who benefited from his presence.

In the end, it is always about the people and Steve was a man for the people.

The jewel in the crown at Camberwell and the thing that sets us apart is our junior program. Boys and girls start playing this wonderful game, many stay for life, many become elite and delivering this program is our life blood.

Steve led a wonderful group of committed volunteers who delivered our junior program. Passion and discipline in the right mix can achieve everything. Steve bought such a personal commitment to this task. His passion and his discipline were in balance. He made it his personal mission to ensure that every child and their family who walked through the gates into Matlock Reserve had a positive experience.

We held a "Sausage for Steve" the Saturday after his passing, for the juniors and their families. 200 people turned up for a snag. We cook a great snag at Camberwell, but they came to recognise the contribution and the man that Steve was to them. Many came to express their thanks for the wonderful experience they have had and how much Steve had influenced this. Families kept coming all day to tell us.

It was personal for Steve.

These days, men are being challenged to recognise the role they have in the community and to rethink their standards and behaviours. The way men relate to women and children, the way men use the influence they have. The levels of consideration and decency, inclusiveness, embracing diversity and the recognition of individuals and their specific needs.

I think society is trying to create more Steve Laussens.

VALE Graeme Cliff

The Club this year farewelled Graeme Cliff after three and a half years living with prostate cancer. Graeme was the type of person that we all want to have as part of our Club. In 2002 he joined the newly formed Camberwell second Veterans (Masters) team and became an enthusiastic contributor to the Men's Senior and Masters sections at various times as a player, umpire, team manager, and coach. Graeme started playing hockey in the early 1970s which probably accounted for his ability to hold down any position on the field, although he accumulated a reputation as an 'attacking full-back' in his later years. He was innovative and a great organiser. In 1980 as president of the Monash University Hockey Club he led the organisation of the inaugural combined Men and Women Intervarsity competition. To fund this venture he ran a profitable high schools hockey carnival held on the fields of Monash University.

Graeme was at his happiest when he was able to play in the same senior team as his sons Edward and Tristan. Renowned for his booming voice on and off the field, there were endless years as a team manager and unofficial coach for both his sons' teams. The culmination of this was the 2013 Men's Metro 2 Premiership campaign, where he got to raise a pennant with them both. He was always immensely giving in his hockey wisdom to all who played with him, and brought many new players along for the ride.

He played in both the Summer Masters Competition based at Matlock Reserve and the over 45's HV Winter competition, always demonstrating his great passion for the game and his team mates. Never one to turn down a game of hockey, Graeme was prone to playing every game going when teams needed a fill in - his Monday nights often ended up being multi-game adventures. Graeme was universally thought of as a wise, kind, respectful and sincere gentleman. We will miss his smiling face, but the Club is greater due to his legacy.

JUNIOR SECTION

Winter Competition

This year the Camberwell Junior Section fielded fifteen teams across four age groups with three u10 teams playing half field, four u12 teams, three u14 teams and five u16 teams. Five teams were Girls only and ten teams were Mixed. The total number of participants in the juniors CHC competition was 201, which was down 5% (10 players) on 2021. Girls numbered 62, representing 30% of the total playing group.

Of the twelve teams that played full pitch, four made the Finals and one of those were minor Premiers. Congratulations to the Girls Shield A team who made the grand final (Coached by Bridget O'Shea & Joanne Peeters).

Progression from juniors to seniors is a big step for any of our players, of the sixty five u16 players, 42 have now transitioned from the Junior program and have been introduced to their Women's and Men's sections. Fifteen players received the CHC medal for having participated in all six years of the u12, u14 and u16 competition's and the girls and boys and their respective families should be very proud of that achievement. The commitment of providing two coaches for every team was maintained with both the Women's and Men's sections providing many of those coaches in either lead or development roles. I am always amazed and very proud of the sheer number of verv talented and experienced coaches who make themselves available for our junior teams, many are parents and many are current players at CHC. It is through this structure that we are able to run a very thorough selection process and then pursue our overall goal of creating an environment in which every girl and boy develops their knowledge and skill of the great game of hockey as well as developing lifelong friendships at the club.

We do have concerns regarding competition from other sports, particularly AFL since we saw a reduction in numbers of participants from the previous season, also the flow on from covid and some players not returning has also reduced numbers in the juniors section. We will once again fully staff our involvement in the HV 2022/3 Roadshow program but with a view to extending the involvement with associated schools across the full school year. We expect that engagement to attract greater participation in both Terms 1 and 4 of 2023.

We are extremely fortunate to have talented and committed members of the Junior Committee, Age Group Coordinators, Team Managers and Coaches who make it all happen and we thank each and everyone of you for your commitment and contribution.

Hookin2Hockey

Programs were successfully run again in Terms 1 with 40 kids attending, and Term 4 where we expect 40-45 kids to attend. Like in previous years Camberwell's new facilities have created a very positive social environment for children, parents and families alike.

We were extremely fortunate to have Hamish Ridland leading the







Hookin2Hickey program this year. Like every program Hamish and his team of coaches, and their team of umpires are all to be congratulated for their delivery of a quality program.

Stick2Hockey Intra Club

This program was run again in Terms 3 and 4 and was also enhanced through the new facilities providing a social hub for parents and families. The fixed time slot and focus on skill, fun and participation provide an important extension to HookIn2Hockey and the transition to u10's and u12's. We had great continuity in management, coaching and umpiring with effectively all those mentioned above in Hi2H involved in this program.

Indoor Hockey

Following successful pre-covid years, the Club has once again committed to participating in the Indoor hockey program with the same level of structure and support provided to the winter program. We have entered 7 teams this year as follows; U12 Mixed Shield, U12 Girls only, U14 Mixed Shield, U14 Girls only, U16 Mixed Shield, U16 Girls only, U16 Mixed Pennant. We look forward to further achievements in Term 4, 2022 and must thank Scott Cashmere once again for leading the Indoor program for CHC this year.

Summer Sixes

A total of 60 Girls and Boys (U10, U12, U14, U16) participated in the seven-week program in Term 4, 2021 and approx. 30 have enrolled for 2022. This year we have reduced the age groups and are just including U10 and U12, the U14 and U16 age group have been encouraged to consider the ever-growing Indoor program. Thanks of course to Steve Laussen and Sarah Church for running this program in 2021.

JSC ('Hot Shots')

The Junior State Championships provide an opportunity for CHC players to be selected in a team (Eastern Hotshots) with players from Waverley, Knox and Echo, and compete against other zones from within the State across four days. JSC is a fantastic opportunity for our juniors to play in a well run and very competitive tournament. 4 Girls and 10 Boys were selected in the respective Under 13 teams where the Girls won a Bronze medal and the Boys finished in a tough tournament 9th place. 9 Girls and 3 Boys were selected in the respective Under 15 teams, with the Girls wining Gold and the Boys finishing in 4th place. 6 Girls and 10 Boys were selected in the Under 18 teams, the Girls and the Boys Teams both won a Gold Medal!!!. These were outstanding results and a credit to Alex Wong (Zone Co-ordinator for HV) and the Coaches and TM's from CHC that committed to the various teams.



Jimmy got started at Box Hill, but quickly moved over to Camberwell where he began the decorated career that he's had to date. His junior career was littered with state and rep teams, from state championship campaigns to selection in the Australian U16 team. All the while, he was playing in various senior sides as a junior, rising through the ranks from Metro 2 until in May of 2006 he played his first game for Camberwell's Men's State League One team.

In the late 2000s, Camberwell were on the cusp of entering a new era of dominance. 2009 saw the first of nine grand final appearances for Webster. Racking up 300 matches meant for some extraordinary personal statistics - in all these years of hockey, Jimmy has only missed one game due to injury!

It was a tough loss in the 2009 grand final to Doncaster, but in 2013 Camberwell exacted their revenge against the same side in a thrilling shootout win. More success was yet to come. Now captain, Jimmy went on to win three more premierships with our MPL side, in 2016, 2017 and 2022. Throughout this time, Webster won the Fin McNab Premier League Best and Fairest award in 2016 and 2022.

Throughout this period, Jimmy's presence at state and national tournaments continued to grow. In 2007, Jimmy played in both the under 18 and 21 Victorian teams, winning gold in the latter, and then again in 2010 at the same tournament. 2010 was also his first year playing for the Victorian Vikings, a side he played in for nine consecutive years until 2018, winning gold in 2016 and 2017.

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TWO SPECIAL LIFE MEMBERS

Since the planning for this special page on two of our Life Members sadly one, Bill Horman, passed away."



Bill "Jock" Horman Life Member and Club Legend

Bill (or Jock as he was more affectionately known) was one of the Dryden St Mob local kids who played a form of hockey in the streets surrounding our ground using fence pickets for hockey sticks and all manner of materials to make a hockey ball. The "Mob" included Alan Carnell, plus other well known 'hockey family' people - Rick & John Purser, Stan Brett & Noel Goodman.

He always played at CHC once joining as a junior; was an wonderful senior player through the 1950's and 1960's and was an outstanding club man. In his hockey career, he

- Played in CHC's A1 team (top grade) from 1950 to 1964
- Victoria Under 21 Representative from 1950 to 1953 (and Captain in 1952 & 1953)

- Victoria State Team Representative from 1954 to 1964
- Was selected for the Australian Olympic Mens Hockey Team for the 1960 Olympics but was unable to go to Rome and compete as there was no financial assistance to athletes in those days. Bill had just moved into a new house and had a child due in November of that year.
- VAHA Delegate in 1961
- CHC Committee member from 1967 to 1977
- CHC Selector for all teams from 1976 to
 1982
- Team Manager of CHC SL1 (now MPL) through the highly successful 80's & 90's (6 Premierships)
- CHC Property Steward from 1972 to 1982
- CHC Records Secretary in 1981 & 1982, but most likely continued in the role thereafter during that decade.
- CHC Life Member since 1989
- Member of the CHC 'Team of the Century' which was announced 19 July 2000

He was instrumental in supervising the installation of the first ever floodlights at Matlock Park, which had been donated by the Nicholas Aspro family from their Burnham Beeches property in Sherbrooke. As an aside, CHC was the first and only Melbourne hockey club to have had a floodlit pitch back then, where you could train at night and which also allowed CHC players to have practice matches vs international hockey teams prior to the start of the 1956 Olympics.

He was an astute hockey brain and could read game play better than most on the sidelines (and on the pitch) whilst managing. Team players of that time have told of passages of play where Bill picked impending turn-overs whilst everyone else thought we had complete control - they then watched in disbelief as the opposition turned us inside out.

He was also legendary in days gone past of smoking up an absolute cloud on the sidelines when games became tense. He hardly ever ventured an opinion though during any game. "That was the Coach's job". I think Argy (Don Argus), amongst others, was happy with that.

We could go on, but perhaps we should be pleased and proud to have had a great club man and role model (he did give up the ciggies) from our earlier years. Bill passed on 1 October 2022, just a few weeks before his 90th birthday.

Sue Howard Life Member Camberwell Women's Hockey Club

Sue joined the Camberwell Women's Hockey Club CWHC) to play first grade hockey in 1983, having moved from Canberra to Melbourne to attend University a couple of years earlier.

In 1983 the CWHC comprised two senior women's teams, and the Club relied heavily on the work of the Secretary at the time, Sherryl Jamison. The load of keeping the club afloat required the work of more people, and Sue joined the Committee as President in 1984, understanding the importance of volunteering in sustaining community sport. She stayed in the role until 1992.

This was a period of stability, growth and success with many capable women in playing, coaching, umpiring and administrative roles. In 1984 Susie Payne and Karen Russ got the first junior girls teams going. A couple of years later Celia Pollock and Pam Jarvis took over coordinating the junior girls section allowing our senior players to focus on coaching and mentoring. Soon our junior girls were filling senior teams at all levels. By 1990 there were six senior women's teams and six junior girl's teams.

Besides work, life at this time was consumed with playing, training, umpiring, being involved with the administration of hockey and socialising with the many friends she made at the Club. Sue played in the Camberwell firsts for ten years and was involved in three premierships. She played another seven years in the seconds and played masters hockey for Camberwell and Victoria until 2002. Sue played State Hockey a couple of times, enjoyed many memorable Easter tournaments in Albury and was part of Camberwell's over 40's team that won gold at the World Masters Games in 2002.

While Sue was President communications between the CWHC and the Camberwell men's club became more formalised and coordinated, but the women's club remained autonomous, and maintained a separate identity until the CHC and the CWHC amalgamated in 2006. Gathering information and recording the history of the Camberwell Women's Club, is something Sue is keen to work on to help round out the whole story of this great community sporting club.

The feedback received from these sessions was positive and there was increased discussion across the Club about supporting those with mental health challenges. We aim to provide some further sessions on request next year.

Another project we facilitated this year was centred around social inclusiveness in teams, as we wanted to foster a feeling of belonging and ongoing connectedness to the Club. What better way to do this than through food! Many dinners were arranged for the teams, with the committee assisting with organising and setup activities.

During yet another Covid lockdown in August 2021 the Camberwell Hockey Club Mental Health First Aid Group came up with a brilliant initiative. It was displaying beloved pet photos along the boundary fence of Matlock Reserve with the aim to put smiles on the faces of those who walk past it. The response was overwhelming with over 800 pet photos on display. The Club invited anyone in the community who would like to recognise their pet for the support they gave during Covid.

At any time of the day you would find locals, and others, enjoying the vast array of photos – dogs, cats, guinea pigs, birds – even two cows. The photos sparked happy smiles and conversations and were a welcome distraction from the sixth lockdown we all experienced.

Feedback from the community was nothing but enthusiastically supportive. Over 350 comments unsolicited comments received.

Following the tragic death of a young female player in 2019, the Club reflected on how it could ensure that it was as supportive as it could be to all players and their families both on and off the field. Initially, the Club asked for volunteers to become Mental Health First Aid Officers. The Club provided on-site mental health training. There was a ground swell of support from members wishing to become a trusted 'first responder' to any club member (or their family) requiring assistance and support in this area.

The Mental Health First Aid Group at the club have conducted a very wide range of programs from speakers to special gift packs for players starting their Year 12 exams.

In addition to the above recognition the Club was awarded a special award from Jellis Craig as part of their community award program. This award was also a recognition of the Club's awareness of and practical support in the mental health of our members and the community generally.





SOCIAL AND FUNDRAISING



With our first full season in over 2 years the club was looking to come out with a bang bringing back some of the old favourites that we have known to expect in a normal hockey season. Over the year the team was able to put on a large array of events that have been widely received by the club members. These events have included Trivia night, Women's round, Men's round & presentation night. The events were run and facilitated by a large selection of social committee members that were able to take it in turns running and suggesting ideas for each event. This method of planning and thinking was intended to promote a broader approach to each of our events and including as many members in the club at each event as possible. Through these events we were able to provide more enjoyment for the Wellers community outside of the normal match day games and helped people cement friendships with the club members we spend so much time with.



The trivia night was themed 'Through the Decades' in which we saw a fantastic collection of dress ups. The event got the sharpest minds of CHC going at it for 3 hours to attempt to prevail as the smartest



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table, whilst also creating a great fundraiser for the club. The event also had a large collection of

generous gifts that had been auctioned off that also helped in creating valuable fundraising for the club.





Women's & Men's rounds were run more around the club with most teams wearing pink & blue socks for the respective rounds. The teams continued to celebrate the two rounds with social media posts in the lead up to the two events, celebratory food & drinks supplied at the canteen ('The Well') and club-based events. These events included a celebration in the club rooms after the Women's round, a raffle to raise money for Berry St Charity and a BBQ after the men's round to get people talking & communicating. The committees also worked in coordination with the Mental Health & Wellness group to ensure that the mental health presentations were given in the two respective weeks to tie the events together.

The final event of the calendar was the presentation night. Hosted at the iconic MCG 225 CHC guests were in the Olympic room for a night of glitz & glamour hosted by Camberwell's own Harry Lang & Keeley Pledge. The event was a great opportunity for the club to look back on the collection and individual successes of the club and celebrate that with awards, trophies and photos.

2022 FINANCE REPORT

The major focus for 2022 was a return to playing hockey for the entire season.

The Club's underlying Income returned to historic levels with all major Income generating activities able to be completed in 2022. Total Income was \$434,545, a modest increase on 2021. Membership Fees were flat year on year. The Canteen operated at full capacity for the entire year and we continue to be well supported by a diverse group of Sponsors. Once again other revenue streams resulting from playing hockey such as Uniform Sales, Ground Hire and Fundraising activities continue to enable the Club to deliver a broad range of programs to its members.

The vast majority of our Cash Operating Expenditure is linked to our core purpose of playing hockey. In 2022 our Cash Operating Expenditure was \$332,034, an increase of \$98,474 or 42% and this is entirely attributable to there being a full Summer and Winter Season.

We also record non cash expenditure in the form of Depreciation in our accounts and this was \$79,631 in 2022, an increase of \$25,142 on 2021. The increase is a result of major capital works completed in the past 12 months being the pitch resurfacing and also the new scoreboard. With regard to the Balance Sheet, the club has maintained a sound level of Cash Reserves which currently sit at \$645,939. This is a reduction year on year of \$139,119, however when you consider it is after capital expenditure of \$244,336, this is a very sound result. The Club recorded positive cash flow from operations of \$99,206 in 2022.

The board considers it prudent to maintain a strong level of cash reserves so as to ensure operating flexibility into the future.

Continuing on the success of the last two years the communication committee worked on maintaining the success for 2022, and focused on ensuring all the Camberwell community were connected in various ways throughout the year.

Website:

Overall, the Camberwell Hockey Club website had another strong year, pivoting back to the kind of engagement we expect during a full season of hockey.

Visits are \uparrow about 16% year on year to 14k. Unique visitors are \uparrow about 19% to 12k which was expected in our first full year out of the pandemic, but great to see, nonetheless.

Geographically, about 13% of our traffic comes from overseas. This is down from last year a bit but given our focus has returned significantly back to on-field activities, it makes sense that more of our traffic would be local. Again, we are seeing the majority of this is coming from the US, in most cases big field hockey states. Otherwise, it's mostly field hockey countries: The UK, India, Canada, Japan, NZ and the continental European powerhouses. Setting aside the landing page, "Get Involved" proved most popular, followed by a roughly even spread across resources, news, registration and about. Contact form submissions are up by 43% year on year.

Google search performance is \uparrow about 95% which is quite significant, but we must remember that prior to April last year we weren't getting the full data, so there's a bit of a discrepancy there. Search impressions are around 386k which is a 302% increase. Our click through rate is down 51% though to 1.13%.

Social Media:

Social Media continues to be one of our biggest channels for connecting with all our members and through new, exciting, and engaging marketing material we continue to increase our community reach. With more varied and exciting topics/ events across all areas of the club we saw an increase in our engagement as a result.

Our WOC Newsletter continues to be our main communication channel to members for our club news. We send out a weekly WOC newsletter containing a wide range of information including results, State and National team announcements, club news, wellbeing articles and so much more. Sections also send out newsletters containing information specific to each section, including match reports, team announcements and upcoming programs. Since December 2021 we've sent 147 email campaigns to our nearly 1500 subscribers (or sub sections of) equating to over 119,934 individual emails being sent, with an overall open rate of 64.1%.
